Public Worship at St Thomas' Remains Cancelled Due to Covid-19

During these summer months, the Priest-in-Charge will celebrate the Sunday Liturgy - on behalf of the whole congregation - in the church on Saturdays at 4 pm.

Our bishops have set September 13th as the day that we are free to resume our regular Sunday services at 10.30 am. The diocese has set out strict requirements that must be followed by parishes for the conduct of public worship: e.g., physical distancing, obligatory non-medical face masks, no congregational singing (only instrumental music and/or a cantor/soloist), holy communion in one kind only, etc. The Priest-in-Charge and Churchwardens will provide detailed information on these rules closer to the time. *We look forward to seeing you back at church this fall!* We plan to continue to record Sunday services for our YouTube channel after start-up.

The parish office (with Gail still working from home) is open Tuesday-Thursday, 9.30-11.30 am, telephone 705-932-2233 (please leave message). For urgent matters, please call the Priest-in-Charge at home (705-932-1231). If (and *only* if) the home voicemail is turned off, please call 705-313-9002, and leave message.

Some of our parishioners are making cloth face masks which are now strongly recommended (and in some parts of the province now required) by Public Health for use in indoor settings. To obtain a mask, please contact the Priest-in-Charge.

A reading from Genesis (32.22-31)

The same night he got up and took his two wives, his two maids, and his eleven children, and crossed the ford of the Jabbok. He took them and sent them across the stream, and likewise everything that he had. Jacob was left alone; and a man wrestled with him until daybreak. When the man saw that he did not prevail against Jacob, he struck him on the hip socket; and Jacob's hip was put out of joint as he wrestled with him. Then he said, "Let me go, for the day is breaking." But Jacob said, "I will not let you go, unless you bless me." So he said to him, "What is your name?" And he said, "Jacob." Then the man said, "You shall no longer be called Jacob, but Israel, for you have striven with God and with humans, and have prevailed." Then Jacob asked him, "Please tell me your name." But he said, "Why is it that you ask my name?" And there he blessed him. So Jacob called the place Penuel, saying, "For I have seen God face to face, and yet my life is preserved." The sun rose upon him as he passed Penuel, limping because of his hip.

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew (14.13-21)

Now when Jesus heard this, he withdrew from there in a boat to a deserted place by himself. But when the crowds heard it, they followed him on foot from the towns. When he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them and cured their sick. When it was evening, the disciples came to him and said, "This is a deserted place, and the hour is now late; send the crowds away so that they may go into the villages and buy food for themselves." Jesus said to them, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat." They replied, "We have nothing here but five loaves and two fish." And he said, "Bring them here to me." Then he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven, and blessed and broke the loaves, and gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the crowds. And all ate and were filled; and they took up what was left over of the broken pieces, twelve baskets full. And those who ate were about five thousand men, besides women and children.

God our creator, give us an awareness of the urgent need to conserve and sustain the gifts of your creation; and grant that we may always help each other, just as you love and help us.

We pray for all who are in need, for the sick, for those in hospital or long-term care, for those who suffer in any way. In the silence of our hearts we recall those commended to our prayers. (*silence*)

God our strength, the comfort of all who suffer; grant patience and healing to your children who cry out to you in their distress.

We pray for all who have died and for all who mourn, especially for the innocent victims state-sponsored violence or oppression. (*silence*)

God our hope, we believe that not even death can separate us from your love. Grant that the faithful departed may know your never-ending compassion and see you face to face.

We pray for ourselves. In all we do this week, may we strive to care for others, following the example of Jesus our Lord and our brother. (*silence*)

your will be done, on earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.
